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From the President of CMSA



As you are reading this issue of the Correo, Volume 27, issue number 1 and 2 of the Boletín will have been printed and mailed to members of CMSA whose 2011 dues are current. Monterey based Cypress Press was able to print this double issue at an affordable cost. Yet, that cost would not permit us to regularly make two hard copy issues a year available as a benefit of membership at our present dues rates.

Those of you attending our 2011 Annual CMSA Conference at Mission San Miguel Arcangel on February 25-27 will have an opportunity to view the new Boletín in brilliant digital format. I just had a chance to preview this at our Treasurer, Lou Sanna's home in Carmel this past week on Rosellen Sanna's iPad. I am a bibliophile and I regard the form, feel and heft of a book as something nearly sacred. But after more than sixty years of book collecting, the Krieger household has run out of linear feet of shelving even with our Victorian home's twelve foot ceilings.

Moreover, the rendition of both the text and images on the iPad was spectacular. I can't wait to view the issue on my large, high definition monitor for my workstation. The advantages of being able to place page markers and notes that will never fall out or, like some of my now ten-year old scotch tabs, become "unstuck," is also attractive.

The CMSA board will be considering the option of making the future digital editions of the Boletín available in hard copy to members for a modest charge plus mailing costs. For scholars, whose academic "publish or perish" requirements may still mandate hard copies, this will be an attractive option.

In the meantime, with the money saved by discontinuing the printed version of the Boletin your board looks forward to creating prize competitions and other incentives to promote 4th Grade California Mission studies, and awarding scholarships and grants for researchers of the mission period.

For those of you coming to San Miguel, we have some special treats.

Friday night, the Conference opens with registration at 4:00 P.M. in Mission San Miguel's wonderful new Community Hall. Registration includes a delicious Cajun reception catered by San Luis Obispo's Bon Temps Café beginning at 5:30. P.M..

The keynote address and concert follow at 7:30 in the beautifully retrofitted Mission church. Cal Poly's Craig Russell, a master musician and scholar of mission music, will give the keynote address. Conductor John Warren and the New World Baroque Orchestra will perform the music of the missions that Craig has written about in his prize winning book, *From Serra to Sancho*.

The musical program will feature rare early Mission music from "La Misa de Sol - Mass in G" by Padre Juan Bautista Sancho, OFM, who was the Pastor of Mission San Antonio de Padua in Jolon from 1804 to 1830, dance tunes from the Garcia Manuscript of 1772 and songs from early Spanish Alta-California. Famous guest artist, Elizabeth Waldo, well-known composer and violinist from Southern California, will perform her latest original composition, "The Lost Violin - A Salinan Song Prayer," with the orchestra.

The program honors the memory of two dedicated women who helped to save and protect California's Missions during the years of abandonment and neglect in the early 20th century - Mamie Goulet Abbott, who returned Mission Santa Ines to its dignified beauty, and Perfecta Encinales, beloved Matriarch of the Salinan Tribe, who with her family prevented Mission San Antonio de Padua from falling into total ruin.

Following the concert, conferees are invited to gather in the spacious meeting rooms at the La Quinta Conference Center, the host facility for our meeting. There should be ample wine and some finger food left over from our reception. Last year at San Luis Rey, the "networking" among mission scholars went into the early hours of the morning despite the thunder and lightening.

At 8:30 A.M. we will return to the San Miguel Community Hall where coffee, tea and light breakfast items will be available. Our sessions will start at 9:15 as follows:

At 12:30 box lunches will be served with beverages and dessert. Additionally, Cultural Videos will present its new High Definition Video of the 21 California Missions

At 2:00 P.M.: Restauración: "The Mission to Save the Missions"-a panel discussion

Drs. Carlotta and Knox Mellon (California Missions Foundation); Anthea Hartig (National Trust for Historic Preservation); Milford Wayne Donaldson (California Office of Historic Preservation) and John M. Foster, RPA (Greenwood-Associates)

Following the panel discussion, there will be a brief break and then we will feature a video of Norman Neuerburg speaking to CMSA at Mission San Miguel twenty years ago and Bob McConnell showing how the murals Norm was lecturing on were affected by the 2003 seismic event and subsequent stabilization.

The banquet begins in the Community Hall at 6:30 P.M. and will be followed by the presentation of the Norman Neuerburg and Edna Kimbro awards and an address by Fr. Larry Gosselin, the Guardian of Mission San Miguel who will oversee the completion of the restoration work. Fr. Larry has promised to speak on "St. Francis of Assisi: Especially Relevant for Our Day."

Sunday Morning will include tours of your choice at the nearby Rios Caledonia Adobe, to the north at Mission San Antonio, and to the south at the Santa Margarita Rancho and Assistencia of San Luis Obispo Mission. There will also be the option of attending Mass at Judge William Clark's Chapel Hill in Shandon, on Highway 46, 16 miles east of Paso Robles.

We look forward to seeing you at "El milagro de la restauración," the "Mission Along the Highway," San Miguel, Arcangel.
